The Parable of Ten Bridesmaids

"Then the Kingdom of Heaven will be like ten bridesmaids—who took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. <sup>2</sup> Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. <sup>3</sup> The five who were foolish didn't take enough olive oil for their lamps, <sup>4</sup> but the other five were wise enough to take along extra oil. <sup>5</sup> When the bridegroom was delayed, they all became drowsy and fell asleep. <sup>6</sup> "At midnight they were roused by the shout, 'Look, the bridegroom is coming! Come out and meet him!'

#### What is the cultural context of the story?

"Typically the betrothal took place in the bride's father's house. It was a festive occasion with blessings, food, candles and celebration. During the period between the betrothal and marriage, which could extend several years – the young woman remained in her father's house. When the wedding day came, after the bride was beautifully adorned and perfumed, she would be taken in a festive celebration to the groom's house. About nightfall the procession would begin and the bride would be escorted to the groom's house by an entourage with torches and lanterns. The groom would go to receive the bride and bring her into his home where the celebration would last as long as seven days."
